Why did the Trust not apply for Business Interruption Insurance? Doesn't this amount to gross negligence because the Trust might have had up to £10.1million to put into grants to communities?	Joe Delaney	At the time of the pandemic, Westway Trust did explore Business Interruption insur- that we were not entitled to this as technically our business was not interrupted. The circumstances of the pandemic, we could continue our business – the collection of letting of property, the delivery of programmes (albeit with adjustments.) They adv be successful should they wish to claim business interruption insurance as some of close. However, we could not advise on this and any claims would be subject to the pursue claims.
		We do not accept the claim of gross negligence. Even if we had been entitled to cla be able to claim direct loss of earnings.
